2024 Achievements

Throughout 2024, Palestinian Vision Organization successfully implemented 10 major projects, directly impacting thousands of individuals across Jerusalem, the West Bank, Gaza, and Bedouin communities. Through training programs, awareness campaigns, and economic and social initiatives, these projects focused on youth empowerment, improving education quality, strengthening economic resilience, and responding to emergencies.



Education and Vocational Training

- **Enhancing Education Quality:** Over 5,000 students, teachers, and counselors benefited from educational development programs, including remedial lessons, teacher and counselor training, and improvements to the learning environment.
- **Supporting Supplementary Education:** 1,400 students received academic support in core subjects, alongside 10 awareness workshops for parents on effective education strategies.
- **Vocational Training:** 140 students participated in vocational education and training programs, equipping them with skills for the labor market.

Economic Empowerment and Entrepreneurship

- **Economic Empowerment of Youth:** 250 young men and women received specialized vocational training, leading to the employment of 130 new graduates in the Palestinian job market.
- **Entrepreneurship Support:** A total of \$200,000 in financial support was awarded to 28 entrepreneurial projects in the Jordan Valley and Jerusalem. Additionally, 40 entrepreneurs received training in business development and financial management.
- **Support for Merchants in Jerusalem's Old City:** 17 businesses received financial grants to sustain their operations, and 38 merchants were trained in e-commerce and digital marketing.
- **Launch of the "Dukkaneh" Platform:** The platform was developed to support Palestinian artisans and merchants, showcasing over 500 Palestinian products and collaborating with 25 home-based businesses.

Emergency Response and Humanitarian Aid

- **Food Assistance:** 1,920 food parcels were distributed to affected families in Gaza and the West Bank.
- **Financial Assistance:** 330 individuals in Gaza received direct financial aid to meet their basic needs.

- **Strengthening the Health Sector:** Support was provided to Jerusalem hospitals through the supply of medicines and medical equipment.
- **Support for Displaced People:** 460 displaced individuals from Gaza, now residing in Jerusalem and Qalqilya, received essential personal supplies.

Civic Engagement and Digital Advocacy

- **Youth Empowerment in Digital Advocacy:** 13 young men and women were trained in digital advocacy, digital security, and political engagement through the “Hirak” program, enabling them to carry out advocacy campaigns in Belgium and Switzerland.
- **Producing Impactful Digital Content:** 373 digital media pieces were created through YPlus platform, reaching 38 million accounts worldwide and generating over 43 million views.

Community Empowerment and Resilience Building

- **Formation of Local Emergency Committees:** 19 emergency committees were established across various regions through multiple projects, with members trained in first aid, psychological first aid, and civil defense.
- **Training Youth Teams for Emergency Response:** 225 young men and women completed an intensive 110-hour training program, equipping them with rapid crisis response skills.
- **Community Resilience Enhancement:** The initiative strengthened community preparedness for emergencies, benefiting 11,872 individuals, including 2,211 in Yatta and the Jordan Valley and 2,500 in refugee camps (Al-Far’a, Jenin, Tulkarem, and Nur Shams). Additionally, 1,161 people participated in awareness sessions and visits, with direct outreach efforts reaching over 6,000 citizens.

Green Pathways

Empowering Youth in the Agricultural Sector

The Green Pathways project worked to economically empower Palestinian youth in the Jordan Valley by developing their life and management skills and enhancing their technical capacities in agribusiness and agrotourism, in line with labor market demands.

As part of its interventions, the project developed an awareness strategy targeting high school and university graduates, as well as unemployed and non-enrolled youth, encouraging them to engage in Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) programs with a focus on green and sustainable skills. Additionally, the project conducted an analytical study of vocational education and training curricula, offering solutions and recommendations to enhance these programs and integrate sustainable skills into the agribusiness and agrotourism sectors within vocational training centers in the Jordan Valley.

In terms of training, the project implemented 60 hours of specialized training in life skills, business, and modern agricultural techniques, benefiting 40 young participants (26 females). These trainings led to the employment of 19 participants (12 females) in private agricultural companies.

The project also supported entrepreneurship in green agriculture, with 219 young men and women (aged 22-35) applying for financial grants. Following a selection and evaluation process, 40 participants (24 women and 16 men) underwent advanced training in design thinking, green entrepreneurship, and smart agriculture, completing 55 training hours per group. In the final stage, participants competed before a specialized evaluation committee, which selected the 12 most innovative agricultural projects to receive financial and technical support in the project's first phase.

The project was implemented in partnership with Masar Center and supported by Oxfam.



Emergency Response

Supporting Affected Communities and Strengthening Resilience

Since the state of emergency was declared in Palestine in October 2023, the Palestinian Vision Organization has intensified its efforts to provide urgent and effective humanitarian support to the most affected communities. Through targeted interventions, the organization aimed to mitigate the impact of the crisis and enhance the resilience of families and merchants facing economic and humanitarian challenges.

Humanitarian Aid and Relief

The emergency response included the distribution of thousands of food parcels to affected families in Gaza, Jerusalem, Jenin, Tulkarem, the Jordan Valley, and Ramallah, ensuring that the most vulnerable populations had access to essential supplies. The organization also provided support to the health sector in Jerusalem, supplying medications and medical aid to Al-Makassed and Augusta Victoria hospitals, strengthening their ability to provide critical healthcare services.

Additionally, 500 families in Tulkarem and Nur Shams refugee camps received infant formula and essential medicines, alleviating the health and economic burden on affected households.

Financial Assistance and Support for Displaced Families

In Gaza, the organization provided direct financial aid to more than 330 beneficiaries, enabling them to meet urgent needs amid deteriorating conditions. Moreover, 300 fresh produce baskets were distributed to affected families to ensure access to essential nutrition. The organization also provided personal supplies to over 460 displaced individuals from Gaza who had relocated to Jerusalem and Qalqilya, easing the burden on host families.

Supporting Merchants and Strengthening the Local Economy

As part of its emergency economic response, the organization launched the “Create Hope in Jerusalem” initiative to support merchants in the Old City, who faced severe economic setbacks Since the beginning of the Israeli aggression on Gaza in October 2023.

Through this initiative, financial grants were provided to 38 businesses, enabling them to purchase equipment and sustain operations. The initiative targeted diverse sectors, including restaurants, tailoring, clothing trade, and services, providing financial stability and

helping business owners adapt to the challenging economic conditions. The project was funded by the Arab Fund for Economic and Social Development – Kuwait.

Establishing Community Emergency Committees

To ensure rapid and effective crisis response, the organization established 19 emergency committees across Jerusalem, Nablus, Salfit, Bethlehem, and the refugee camps of Tulkarem, Nur Shams, Al-Far'a, and Jenin. Committee members underwent specialized training in civil defense, first aid, and psychological support, enhancing their ability to respond to emergencies and support their communities during crises.

“Himam” Project – Youth-Led Emergency Response Training

The “Himam” project aimed to strengthen youth capacities in emergency response by forming three youth groups in Jenin Refugee Camp, Tulkarem Refugee Camp, and the villages of Northwest Jerusalem.

A total of 45 young participants (15 from each area) underwent an intensive 60-hour training program, divided into two key components:

- 40 hours of emergency response training
- 20 hours of data collection, analysis, and sharing during crises

The project successfully trained active youth teams capable of serving as first responders in their communities, enhancing local preparedness and crisis management. The project was funded by Oxfam.

“Smile and Hope” Project – Mental Health Support for Children in Jerusalem

The “Smile and Hope” project aimed to support children’s psychological well-being in Jerusalem through 27 open days in schools and educational centers. The initiative provided a safe and supportive environment where children could express themselves and cope with psychological challenges.

Activities included art workshops and sports programs, which contributed to improving children’s mental health and enhancing their social skills. The initiative reached 23 schools and held four community open days, alongside 25 psychological support sessions for parents, allowing them to share experiences and discuss strategies for managing their children’s emotional well-being.

Through these diverse interventions, and with funding from the Swiss Protestant Aid (HEKS/EPER), the Palestinian Vision Organization successfully provided direct and effective support to affected families, merchants, and healthcare sectors, strengthening the resilience of Palestinian communities in the face of escalating crises.





Salalem Project

Enhancing Education Quality Through Creative Approaches

The Salalem project focuses on improving education quality and enhancing the academic and creative performance of students from grades one to six. By implementing innovative teaching strategies, engaging parents in their children's education, and developing the capacities of teachers and counselors, the project fosters a more dynamic and supportive learning environment.

Targeting the governorates of Jerusalem, Ramallah, Nablus, Tulkarem, Bethlehem, and Hebron, the project introduced interactive and educational programs to enrich children's learning experiences.

As part of its interventions, the project provided remedial lessons in core subjects to over 1,400 students and organized 10 awareness workshops for parents, focusing on supportive learning strategies and effective communication with children. One of its key initiatives, the "Father and I" league, engaged over 100 fathers and children in interactive learning activities, strengthening parent-child relationships through education.

The project also trained 15 university students in the fundamentals of supportive education, enabling them to actively contribute to educational activities. Additionally, 14 interactive open days were held, featuring five learning stations covering music, movement, arts, creative thinking, and environmental awareness.

To further develop an engaging and interactive educational environment, the project designed two educational games—"Masar" and "Khutuwat" to enhance student engagement in classrooms. Furthermore, the "Sada Sawtak" (Echo of Your Voice) music program was implemented to support remedial education teachers, benefiting more than 70 educators by helping them adopt new and innovative teaching methodologies.

The project was implemented in partnership with Save the Children and funded by the Norwegian Agency for Development Cooperation (Norad).



Masar Project

Emergency Response for Learning Recovery and Youth Empowerment

The Masar project was launched as an emergency response to address learning loss among students while simultaneously empowering Palestinian youth to play an active role in supporting the education system. Implemented through a “Cash for Work” approach, the project provided young participants with training, professional and educational skills, and sustainable income opportunities.

A total of 60 young men and women were trained as academic and vocational mentors, equipping them with guidance and counseling skills. These mentors provided one-on-one support to 240 students in Nablus and Tulkarem, helping them recover lost learning, improve academic performance, and build self-confidence. This initiative directly mitigated the educational disruptions caused by ongoing crises.

Expanding its impact, the project organized interactive open days in 40 locations, reaching over 5,000 beneficiaries. These activities strengthened connections between children, their families, and local communities, providing them with essential knowledge and skills to support their academic and personal stability.

Moreover, the project allowed young participants to gain hands-on experience in education and mentoring, significantly enhancing their employability in the labor market. By creating job opportunities for Palestinian youth, supporting students in overcoming educational challenges, and fostering community resilience, the project contributed to building a more adaptive and prepared society for future challenges.



Buthoor Project

Youth Empowerment and Employment Promotion

The Buthoor project aimed to foster a sustainable economic environment that enhances employment opportunities and entrepreneurship for Palestinian youth by equipping them with practical skills and increasing their readiness for the labor market.

The project trained over 240 young graduates and job seekers (ages 18-35), providing them with essential skills to improve their career prospects. It successfully secured employment opportunities for more than 130 beneficiaries, helping them integrate into the Palestinian job market.

To ensure long-term employment sustainability, the Palestinian Vision Organization signed Memorandums of Understanding with 13 Palestinian companies and organizations, facilitating the training and employment of participants. Additionally, the project supported 40 entrepreneurs in Jerusalem, offering intensive training in business development, digital transformation, and financial management. It also provided financial grants of up to \$10,000, supporting more than 20 startups, contributing to their growth and sustainability.

The project was implemented in partnership with StationJ and funded by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC).





Himaya Project

Awareness on Explosive Remnants of War and Emergency Response Strengthening

The Himaya project aimed to raise community awareness about the dangers of explosive remnants of war (ERW) and landmines while establishing youth emergency response committees capable of immediate crisis intervention.

The project trained 40 volunteers in the Jordan Valley and Yatta on ERW risk awareness, alongside 21 volunteers in Al-Far'a, Jenin, Tulkarem, and Nur Shams refugee camps, equipping them to educate their communities on safety and protection measures.

Additionally, the project established and strengthened three youth emergency response committees in Jenin, Nur Shams, and Al-Far'a refugee camps, with the participation of 65 young men and women, including 36 females. These participants received specialized training in first aid, psychological first aid, and civil defense, enhancing their ability to provide rapid response and support their communities during emergencies. To ensure the sustainability of these committees, Memorandums of Understanding were signed with popular committees in the targeted refugee camps, securing the long-term maintenance of emergency response teams and their equipment.

The project expanded its outreach through 26 field awareness sessions and 105 home visits, benefiting 1,161 individuals. Additionally, direct awareness campaigns reached over 6,000 people in collaboration with the Palestinian Mine Action Center. A national referral system was also developed to ensure victims receive necessary services.

In total, the project benefited 11,872 individuals, including 2,211 in Yatta and the Jordan Valley and 2,500 in the targeted refugee camps, strengthening local communities' ability to respond to emergencies and promoting safer practices.

The project was funded by the United Nations Mine Action Service (UNMAS), contributing to enhanced community preparedness against security and environmental risks.



Tamkeen Project

Empowering and Revitalizing Old City Businesses

The “Empowering and Revitalizing Old City Businesses” project aimed to support merchants and enhance business sustainability by developing their e-commerce and digital marketing skills, providing direct financial support, and establishing an online platform to expand market access.

The project focused on three main components:

- E-Commerce Training: 38 merchants received 40 hours of specialized training in digital marketing and online store management, along with financial grants to enhance digital promotion and increase sales, in partnership with Burj Al-Luqluq Social Center Society.
- Financial Support for Businesses: 17 small and medium-sized businesses received financial grants, enabling them to develop their operations and strengthen their resilience amid economic challenges.
- Launching “Dukkaneh” – A Digital Platform for Palestinian Handicrafts: The project supported the development of “Dukkaneh”, an e-commerce platform providing local artisans and merchants with access to domestic and international markets. The platform collaborates with 25 home-based businesses and features over 500 Palestinian products, promoting economic independence for small merchants and entrepreneurs.

Through these interventions, the project strengthened the ability of Palestinian merchants to adapt to economic shifts and explore new opportunities for growth in digital markets.

The project was funded by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).



The Coordination Committee

Strengthening Child Protection Through Institutional Collaboration in Jerusalem

The Palestinian Vision Organization implemented the Coordination Committee project to strengthen the role of institutions working in child protection in Jerusalem by unifying efforts and improving responses to the needs of the most vulnerable children. The project contributed to developing intervention mechanisms and activating the “Aoun” referral system to ensure the provision of specialized services based on children’s needs in Jabal Al-Mukabber, Silwan, Shu’fat Refugee Camp, the Old City, Al-Issawiya, Sheikh Jarrah, and Wadi Al-Joz.

In 2024, member institutions organized open recreational days and digital safety workshops in collaboration with the Arab Center for the Advancement of Social Media. Additionally, six legal workshops were conducted in partnership with MADA Center, targeting 45 children and 54 parents to enhance awareness of the rights of detained children. Furthermore, six music therapy workshops were held to support children in expressing their emotions and reducing stress.

Numu Project

Adolescent Empowerment and Community Awareness

The Numu project focused on empowering adolescents in Jerusalem Governorate by developing their life skills, raising awareness on physical and mental health, combating bullying, and promoting safe social media usage.

A total of 577 adolescents participated in the project, which began with the training of 15 YPeer volunteers on adolescent empowerment through life skills. These volunteers were also trained to deliver 11 puppet theater performances, using interactive storytelling to convey awareness messages. Additionally, 13 school counselors from targeted schools in Jerusalem, Al-Ram, Al-Eizariya, Anata, Hizma, and Sur Baher received training on promoting positive practices and behaviors among adolescents. This was supported by the “Majd” workbook, which provided practical tools to help students develop facilitation skills and group engagement techniques.

Project activities also included three summer camps offering interactive extracurricular programs and five open days to enhance participants’ skills. Furthermore, parenting awareness workshops were organized for 470 parents, focusing on positive parenting strategies and effective adolescent communication, strengthening family support for adolescents’ psychological and social growth.

The project also implemented a film production training program for 40 female students from Jerusalem and Kafr Aqab, resulting in the creation of 10 short films addressing key social issues such as bullying and gender-based violence. This provided participants with an opportunity to use media as a tool for expression and community impact.

The project was implemented in partnership with the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) and funded by the Italian Development Fund.



Hirak Project

Empowering Youth in Digital Advocacy

Palestinian Vision Organization, through the YPlus platform, launched the “Hirak” project to empower Jerusalemite youth to become influential change leaders in digital spaces. The project focused on enhancing participants’ skills in digital advocacy, political engagement, and international communication, contributing to the amplification of the Palestinian narrative worldwide and strengthening its presence in the digital sphere despite political and censorship challenges.

The project trained 13 young men and women in advocacy tools, digital security, and impactful campaigning, enabling them to implement effective outreach initiatives with European civil society and decision-makers. A total of 373 digital materials were produced and published through the YPlus platforms, reaching over 38 million global accounts and garnering more than 43 million views, further enhancing the global reach of the Palestinian narrative.

As part of their training, participants visited the European Parliament and met with representatives of international organizations. They also carried out advocacy missions to Brussels, Geneva, and Zurich, where they engaged with European civil society organizations and youth networks, fostering international dialogue and expanding political and media influence on the Palestinian cause.

The project was supported by DanChurchAid (DCA).

Together We Can

Supporting Children's Rights in Jerusalem

The Together We Can project aimed to promote human rights in the Jerusalem Governorate, improve the conditions of marginalized and violence-affected children, and support their families and caregivers. The project focused on reintegration efforts, creating a safe and supportive environment, and enhancing the capacities of local institutions working in child protection.

The project targeted various areas inside and outside the Separation Wall in Jerusalem, including Sur Baher, Ath-Thawri, At-Tur, Al-Eizariya, Al-Ram, Biddu, Beit Surik, Qalandiya, Jaba', and As-Sawahira. It collaborated with 10 grassroots organizations specializing in child protection, providing training to strengthen their ability to deliver psychoso-

cial support services to children and their families.

As part of its initiatives, the project developed a research study titled "The Main Causes of Violence, Torture, and Abuse, and Future Aspirations". This study became a key reference for shaping evidence-based policies and programs, helping to increase community awareness and drive positive change in child protection.

Additionally, specialized training programs were conducted, including:

- Child Protection Training: Enhancing knowledge on children's rights and protection from violence and abuse.
- Project Proposal Writing: Assisting grassroots organizations in developing strong project proposals to secure small grants for community activities.
- Team Up Program: Utilizing movement-based activities to support children aged 6-17, strengthening their psychological resilience in coping with violence-related challenges.

The training sessions also covered child protection awareness, psychological support services, and guidance on referral mechanisms for cases of suspected child abuse.

The project was implemented with the support of War Child and in partnership with the Center for the Rehabilitation of Torture Victims and the Human Rights and Democracy Media Centers (SHAMS).



Jothuri Project

Strengthening Farmers' Resilience in Palestine

Amid ongoing threats to Palestinian agricultural lands, the Jothuri Project aimed to enhance the resilience of farmers in Area C by empowering them to defend their agricultural rights and confront environmental and settlement-related violations. The project focused on raising awareness among farmers and youth about the importance of land protection and agricultural heritage, documenting violations targeting the agricultural sector, and strengthening community engagement in defending farmers' rights and natural resources.

Implemented in Battir and Al-Walaja, in collaboration with the Bethlehem Directorate of the Ministry of Agriculture, the Environmental Quality Authority, and local village councils and municipalities, the project achieved several milestones. These included developing an analytical report documenting violations against farmers' rights and launching a digital media campaign featuring educational materials and podcasts. Additionally, two volunteer days were organized during the olive harvest season, engaging 40 young men and women, along with a guidance tour for 50 participants to raise awareness about preserving natural heritage and adapting to climate change.

The project was funded by Danish Church Aid (DCA).
